The Profile of a Wyoming Lawyer

Tell me a about yourself?

By some small miracle Carol Thompson agreed to marry me a little over a year ago and now we're happily ensconced on a little house on the prairie. Additionally, my daughter was able to overcome the disability of having me as a father and is relatively well adjusted, employed as a social worker, and happily married to a wonderful man, Pat Mangan. They live in Denver. My stepson Darren currently lives in Cheyenne. He works as a yardmaster for the Union Pacific Railroad.

Why did you decide to go to law school?

Like many young aspiring lawyers, I thought that the practice of law would be a great way to help people, provide service to my community and plus provide me with the means to make a decent living. Fortunately my hopes were realized.

What was your first job after law school?

In 1979 I went to work as a deputy county attorney in the Natrona County Attorney's Office (this was before the implementation of the District Attorney Office).

What has been your most rewarding or significant case?

Over the thirty plus years that I have been a prosecutor I have worked on thousands of cases - having handled everything from first degree murder cases to barking dog complaints. While a number of those cases have had an impact upon me, the case I probably talk about the most is an attempted sexual assault case that was either my first or second felony jury trial. During my closing argument I noted that a number of the jurors were vigorously nodding their heads as I was speaking. Not being very quick on the uptake, it took me close to 10 minutes before I realized that the jurors were not nodding their heads in agreement with what I thought was a brilliant argument, but rather trying to indicate to me to check my fly. When I did check, I found that not only was my fly unzipped, but a bright red dry cleaning sticker was protruding from the opening. I stepped back behind the podium, zipped up, and noted that all the jurors gave a collective nod of the head and I went about my business. I seriously doubt that one of those jurors heard a word I said.




What has kept you inspired and energized over the years?

Just like everyone else the daily grind can wear me down. However, when I think of some of the cases I have handled and the folks I have been able to help in some small way I realize I am doing important work that matters. That keeps me going.

What do you like best about being a Wyoming lawyer?

For the most part we have a collegial bar with good relationships between defense counsel, prosecutors and the bench. That is huge benefit to all of us within the system.

Is there anything the Clerk's office could improve on?

I would like trumpet players to announce my entry into the courtroom. Other than that, you are all great.

Is there anything else you'd like to add?

I have a great job, work with wonderful people, and was absolutely NUTS to consider leaving.
