The Profile of a Wyoming Lawyer



Gregory A. Phillips
United States Circuit Judge
United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit

Greg Phillips, age 52, grew up in Evanston, Wyoming. Both sides of his family had resided in Uinta County for generations. In 1983, he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics from the University of Wyoming. In 1987, he received his law degree with honors from the University of Wyoming College of Law, and was Selected to the Order of the Coif. From 1987 to 1989, he served as law clerk to Judge Alan B. Johnson of the United States District Court for the District of Wyoming.

In 1989, Phillips joined his father and brother in their general law practice in Evanston. In 1990 and 1991, he also served as a part-time Uinta County deputy county attorney. From 1993 through 1998, in addition to practicing law, he represented Uinta County in the Wyoming State Senate. In 1998, Phillips and Matthew H. Mead opened a law firm in Cheyenne. In 2003, after Mr. Mead's appointment as United States Attorney for the District of Wyoming, Phillips joined that office as an Assistant U. S. Attorney, primarily prosecuting criminal cases and appeals. After being elected Governor, Mr. Mead named Phillips as his choice to serve as Attorney General, and the state senate unanimously confirmed him for that position.

On January 31, 2013, President Obama nominated Phillips to serve as a United States Circuit Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit, upon Judge Terrence L. O'Brien's having declared his intention to take senior status. On July 8, 2013, the Senate confirmed Phillips nomination 88-0. On July 22, 2013, Phillips was sworn in as a Judge for the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals.
