Updates to COVID-19 Procedures



The U.S. District Court for the District of Wyoming has issued a new general order for courthouse entry during the COVID-19 pandemic.

As the District of Wyoming remains in a <u>area of substan-</u>

<u>tial or high transmission</u> as designated by the CDC, individuals entering the District's courthouses are required to wear a face mask, whether fully vaccinated or not, while in any public areas.

- September 6, 2021 for Labor Day holiday.
- October 11, 2021 for Columbus Day

When the District of Wyoming went live on NextGen in October 2020, it brought about numerous changes. One of the changes that seems to continue to be overlooked is how Pro Hac

Vice attorneys are added to a case once their Motion for Pro Hac Vice admission is granted.

The <u>Clerk's office personnel can no longer add Pro Hac</u> <u>attorneys into the system</u> when they docket the Order granting the Pro Hac Vice admission.

Sponsoring Pro Hac Vice Attorneys Cont...

Instead when the Order is docketed granting Pro Hac Vice admission into a case, that Order is e-mailed to the Pro Hac Vice attorney. That email also directs said attorney to file a "Notice of Attorney Appearance (Pro Hac Vice)" and informs them that until they file this notice in the ECF case, they will NOT be added nor begin receiving any notice of electronic filings in that case. This step is being missed and we regularly have Pro Hac Vice attorneys missing out on seeing filings and calling our office to inquire as to why this is happening.

If you are sponsoring an attorney who is coming into a case Pro Hac Vice, please make sure that they are completing this step. If additional information is needed on how to get a Pro Hac Vice attorney registered for e-filing in the district, please refer to: https://www.wyd.uscourts.gov/attorney-admissions.

Comments Invited on Proposed Rules for Future Emergencies

The bench, bar, and public have been asked to provide comments on a series of proposed rules that would, if approved, guide the Judiciary in responding to future declared emergencies that impair federal court operations. The proposals include amendments to Appellate Rules 2 and 4, and new emergency Bankruptcy, Civil, and Criminal Rules.
