JUDGE JOHNSON: Thank you, ladies and gentlemen.

Please be seated.

I am pleased to welcome everyone who has come here,
family and friends, to celebrate in this citizenship
proceedings in the United States District Court for the
District of Wyoming. It is very gratifying to see all of the
faces out there of family members and friends who want to be

present on this important day for these new citizens.

So we welcome you and hope that you will participate in these proceedings and feel free to move about the courtroom. We are suspending the usual rules that prohibit cameras and recording devices in the courtroom, and we certainly allow you to take photographs. And I see some of you way in the back there with your cameras. You should feel free to move close and even come through the rail here during this ceremony and take pictures to preserve the memories of this important ceremony. And when it is over, we will remain in the courtroom so that you can pose your new citizen family member and friend here by the flag of the United States of America, to which we will pledge allegiance later in this proceedings, and take photographs right here next to the bench.

This is a special day. Pursuant to tradition, there

are gifts that will be given by and mementos of this ceremony from patriotic organizations that have supported citizenship and these citizenship ceremonies through many years. And I am pleased to welcome:

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The Daughters of the American Revolution, Pam Immig, Jean Rayl, Judy Engelhart who is the regent, Kim Zwonitzer, and Helen Bolognesi.

The Colonial Dames, Shirley Flynn, JoAnna Kline,
Dorothy Torkelson, and Claire Davis are present representing
that organization.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary 4343, pleased again as so often she is present supporting these ceremonies, Emma Fosdick and Mary Lou Lynn.

Veterans of Foreign Wars 1881 Auxiliary, Diana Shinneman, Carol Tabor, and Hazel Johnson.

American Legion Post Auxiliary #6, Leigh Vossler is present as well.

And I believe that Larissa Larson, the passport specialist supervisor at the Colorado passport agency at Aurora, Colorado, is also present in court. Would you stand?

DEPUTY CLERK NIELSEN: Your Honor, I think she is across the hall where the tea is going to be held.

JUDGE JOHNSON: All right. And I want to tell everyone that in our jury assembly room across the hall following this ceremony, immediately following this ceremony,

will be a tea, and all of you are welcome to attend and partake in that celebration. Our hostesses for the tea are the Daughters of the American Revolution, and we thank them for their efforts to make the tea a pleasant circumstance for us.

As a special treat today, we have a guest speaker who will be delivering an address to our new citizens, and I'm just so pleased to welcome into this courtroom a representative of the state judiciary for the State of Wyoming. He is also an individual who has had honorable service in our United States Army before coming back to Wyoming to practice law. He practiced law for many years in a firm located here in Cheyenne, Wyoming. Peter G. Arnold is a judge of the state district court, the First Judicial District, here in Laramie County, Wyoming, and you will be hearing from him later as we proceed in this matter.

The representative of the federal government, the government of the United States of America, is Mark Klaassen.

Mark is an Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Wyoming, and he is here to make the motion seeking to admit each and every one of you as citizens.

Mr. Klaassen, I'd be pleased to hear from you first.

MR. KLAASSEN: Thank you very much, Your Honor. May it please the Court.

As the Court has just introduced me, my name is Mark

Klaassen, and I am here today appearing as a representative of the United States Attorney's Office for the District of Wyoming and in proxy for the Attorney General of the United States in these proceedings.

It's my privilege, Your Honor, to introduce to the Court the following individuals who are appearing today in person for a hearing on their petitions for naturalization as a United States citizen.

JUDGE JOHNSON: Would you each stand as Mr. Klaassen calls your names.

MR. KLAASSEN: I'll do my best with some of these pronunciations, but you'll have to forgive me if I don't get it quite right.

The first name is Miss Panfila Romero Martinez, a native and former inhabitant of Mexico; Mr. Miguel Hernandez, a native and former inhabitant of Mexico; Mr. Jorge Arturo Giron Bencomo, a native and former inhabitant of Mexico; Miss Chia Fang Hsu, a native and former inhabitant of Taiwan; Miss Yvonne June Newsom, a native and former inhabitant of Canada; Miss Yekaterina Andreevna Minaicheva, a native and former inhabitant of Russia; Miss Geeta Sharma, a native and former inhabitant of India; and last, but certainly not least, Miss Marcella Bird, a native and former inhabitant of Mexico.

Your Honor, each of these individuals has been interviewed and examined under oath by a designated examiner

of United States Citizenship and Immigration Services who has completed a character and background investigation. Citizen and Immigration Services has indicated that each of these individuals has met all the requirements for naturalization and is well qualified as a desirable candidate for United States citizenship.

As a fellow citizen of the United States, I want to welcome and congratulate each of these petitioners on this occasion. It's my privilege to participate in what I hope is a very memorable and meaningful experience for you here today.

And so on recommendation of the immigration officer, it is my distinct honor to move that all of these petitioners be granted United States citizenship upon taking the oath.

JUDGE JOHNSON: Thank you, Mr. Klaassen.

Each of you should raise your right hands, and I will ask that the courtroom deputy administer the lengthy oath.

And I would ask that each of you who are seated in the audience should feel free to come forward and take photographs, if you wish, move closer and even come through on into the main area here of the court to take those photographs while the oath is being administered.

I would ask that everyone harken to this lengthy oath that reminds each of us of the oath that -- of the duties and obligations that we have as citizens that we take for granted so often. So listen carefully, and in your own minds take

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this oath along with our new citizens.

That order recognizes that each of you have taken 10 all of the steps, passed all of the examinations, have resided 11 here, and are fully qualified for citizenship in this the most 12 altruistic and caring nation on earth. I am pleased to sign that order for each of you at this moment. 13 14 I think all of these folks deserve a hand, don't you? 15 (Applause.) 16 To present mementos of this special JUDGE JOHNSON: 17 occasion in your lives, the American flag and Flag Code will 18 be presented by representatives of the Veterans of Foreign 19 Wars Auxiliary 1881. 20 (Presentation of American flag and Flag Code.) 2.1 JUDGE JOHNSON: The Star Spangled Banner booklet is a 22 product of the work of Deborah Nielsen, one of our courtroom 23 deputies here for the Clerk of Court's Office, and it will be

presented by the Colonial Dames. Shirley Flynn is here to

make that presentation and Dorothy Torkelson.

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(Presentation of Star Spangled Banner booklet.) 1 2 JUDGE JOHNSON: The Wyoming Constitution will be presented by American Legion Post #6 Auxiliary. 3 (Presentation of Wyoming Constitution.) 4 Thank you. And a copy of the United 5 JUDGE JOHNSON: States Constitution will be presented by Veterans of Foreign 6 Wars, the 4343 Auxiliary. 7 (Presentation of United States Constitution.) 8 JUDGE JOHNSON: And most important of all I am going to send our courtroom deputy to each of you to deliver your 10 certificates of citizenship. As you receive it, will you 11 12 please stand so that your family member can take a photograph 13 if they wish to do so. 14 (Presentation of certificates of citizenship.) It is now my distinct honor to 15 JUDGE JOHNSON: 16 introduce the Honorable Peter G. Arnold, Judge of the state 17 district court, First Judicial District, Laramie County, 18 Wyoming. 19 JUDGE ARNOLD: Thank you, Judge Johnson. 20 It is -- may it please the Court. 2.1 JUDGE JOHNSON: Judge Arnold. 22 JUDGE ARNOLD: -- my distinct pleasure to be here to 23 welcome you. I have here five passports. Four of them are 2.4 mine that I accumulated over the years. One of them belongs

to my daughter, who was born in Germany in 1977, and I don't

know if you can see her photo. I brought these to remind myself of how easy it was for me to get these. All I had to do was fill out a couple of forms, submit proof of birth and send a check in, whereas compared to you all, you all had to work to get to this point, and for that I feel honored to be selected to say a couple of words to you. I don't have anything to give to you. I just have a couple of words I'd like to say.

I reviewed the requirements it takes to become a U.S. citizen. One thing that I didn't see in the listed requirements was courage. It takes courage for each of you to leave your home, your home country. There are family members that you left at home, friends that you left at home to come to our country and to become a citizen of our country. That takes courage, and for that I respect each of you.

I was talking with Judge Johnson a little bit this morning as we were getting ready for this proceeding, and one of the things that I enjoy the most about being a district judge in Wyoming is that I get to do adoptions, a joyous event, a happy event when a couple who have been unable to have children have this very young child that they are adopting. And I encourage them to provide a safe, warm, comfortable home for that child. And I think this is somewhat similar. We all are adopting you. The United States is adopting you, and I am confident that you will be provided

safe, warm, comfortable homes.

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I prepared all this stuff before I knew I only had about five minutes, so I'm going to have to cut it down a bit.

I noticed that in 2008 there were 1,046,539 people who became naturalized citizens, which was a high year over the last ten years, but in that year there were 245 in Wyoming who became naturalized citizens, the lowest number in the United States, but that's one of the reasons that we live here. We like it this way.

I wanted to say a couple of words to you also about the responsibilities that I believe you assume when you become a citizen. One of them is to vote. And before you can vote you should make great efforts to inform yourselves of the positions of each of the candidates.

Another responsibility I believe you have is to maintain your own cultural identity. Be who you were 20 minutes ago because that adds to the richness of our whole society.

I encourage you all to become involved in community activities. There are and these ladies here are terrific examples of the benefits achieved from community activity.

I also read that Justice Brandeis, Justice Louis
Brandeis, who was a justice of the United States Supreme
Court, he served from 1916 until 1939, his opinions were,
according to legal scholars, some of the greatest defenses of

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freedom of speech and the right to privacy ever written by a
